The Spryfield District Farmers Market Update

Spryfield Community Market Society

The Spryfield and District Community Market was born as a seed, and several community members gathered to nourish the seed and find it a home to grow. Launching on May 15th with close to 2000 visitors, the market is a welcome addition to Spryfield and neighboring communities. Hosted at the Lions Rink on Drysdale Road, it runs alternate Sundays from 8 am to 12 pm. Our vendors offer a range of fresh and prepared foods, including sustainably raised meat, and local produce.

The Spryfield Community Market Society, the market's initiator, is a not-for-profit society founded on human capital, community partners and the public desire to establish and support a seasonal farmers' market. The market's aim is fourfold: improve local access to fresh Nova Scotia farm produce, prepared foods, and local crafts; provide an opportunity for small local farm and craft businesses and new business start-ups; offer a new social gathering place for Spryfield and the nearby communities; and provide an education component.

With an increase in vendors from 27 to 36 most markets, as well as a steady stream of interest from new vendors, the market is one of the newest community fixtures. Our location allows us to operate no matter what the weather, and will continue to do so until December. The market also hosts an activity corner and cafe,



the latter of which will be taken over by ACICC Cafe. This is the African Community Investment Cooperative of Canada, the newest Spryfield enterprise and another not-for-profit. We are excited to welcome them to the market family.

A market holds much potential for community building and development, including synergistic relationships like these. Many are looking forward to see what else the market has to offer to the community, including collaboration with local organizations to expand educational opportunities.

We're Trail Blazing!

Construction on the Nichols Lake Loop Trail is slated to begin this summer – perhaps even by the time this issue of The Prospective makes it into mailboxes. The trailhead entrance will be located behind the Prospect Road Community Centre. The first phase of this regional park plan will put in the trailhead, and go as far as possible with the allocated budget for this year. Additional funds are allocated for 2017 and will continue into the future as the park plan spans multiple years. We're excited to watch and then hike the progress!

The project is being managed by HRM Parks - Capital Projects.


In preparation for the closing of the current growing season, the garden members plan on meeting in September to discuss harvesting and the closing of the garden beds.

Prospect Road Community Food Share

The Prospect Road Community Food Share is an emergency food bank operating out of St Timothy's Anglican Church in Hatchet Lake.

The food share program is solely supported by the community. Our coverage area stretches from Goodwood to East Dover with all communities in between. While there is always a need for non-perishable food items, September can often be a hard time for families due to the many items they need to purchase to prepare for the new school year.

Though we do not get involved in fulfilling the needs of school supplies, donations of gift cards are a wonderful help for those in need. School year needs also include items necessary for packed lunches and snack time, such as juice packs, healthy fruit packs, puddings, snack bars, raisins etc.

What are all these runners doing out here at this hour?

Have you asked yourself that question on the last Saturday of September? It's still dark at 6:30 a.m., yet there's a bobbing line of reflective vests heading northeast on Prospect Road. And the traffic! What's going on?

It's the Rum Runners Relay! Founded in 1985, the relay goes from Halifax to Lunenburg. The start line used to be located at the Halifax ferry terminal, moved to various locations along the Prospect Road and is now staged at the Prospect Road Community Centre. The finish line has moved several times, but it has remained in Lunenburg with the exception of the first relay which started in Lunenburg and finished in Halifax—in November!

This, the 32nd running of the relay, will see 70 teams of 10 complete the 110K route, mostly on Highway 3. There are 10 legs and each leg starts at a specific time: 6:30 a.m. from the PRCC, 8:00 from the Lakeside Community Centre...right through to the start of leg 10 at 5:37 p.m. from the public wharf in Mahone Bay. The legs are all different lengths: the longest is leg 4, which is 17.1K from the Head of St. Margaret's Bay to Queensland Beach and the shortest, leg 5, is 3.8K from Queensland Beach to Hubbards. Most legs are between 7 and 12 kilometers long.

The runners come from all over the Maritimes and beyond. This year we have teams from Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, PEI, and Ontario. Every other year we get one or two teams from St-Pierre and Miquelon. This is a competitive race; Runners have to complete their leg before the next leg starts, which means maintaining a minimum pace of 6 minutes/kilometer, regardless of the terrain. The runners come for the scenery, the challenge, the water stop competition, and the post-relay banquet in Lunenburg. After enduring 20 years of cold pizza and warm pop, we've added soup, subs, and burritos as



options—all washed down with warm pop. Some traditions won't die! Another tradition is the rum barrel. A true antique, the rum barrel is covered in little brass plaques that name all the people on the winning teams. It's a historical archive of the who's who in performance distance running in the province: names such as Randy Bullerwell, Rami Bardeesy, Norm Tinkham, Steve Morley, Denise Robson, and Nick McBride all appear more than once.

So, if you find yourself driving along Prospect Road between the PRCC and the Highway 3 onramp at 6:30 on the morning of Saturday, September 24 and you see the otherworldly sight of all that reflective material, you'll know it's not an alien invasion—it's the Rum Runners Relay.

Help Shape a Better Democracy in Nova Scotia - Explore Alternative Voting Systems

With the support of the Resource Opportunities Centre serving the Prospect Road and surrounding areas, The Springtide Collective and our community partners are on a mission to find the best voting system for Nova Scotia. Last year, during our Make Democracy Better engagement, participating Nova Scotians told us that exploring alternatives to the first past the post voting system should be a top priority. We're inviting you to join the conversation on voting systems.

This event will be a 2.5 hour session, hosted by the Springtide Collective and our Prospect Road Youth Council, where participants will:

- » learn about 5 different models for voting systems that Nova Scotia could use
- » engage in conversation with hosts and other participants with the goal of exploring these models more deeply, and providing input on what the best voting system for Nova Scotia is.
- » plug into a province-wide conversation on alternative voting systems, and connect to a growing community of people who like democracy and think it can be done better.



In advance of the event, Springtide has released a discussion paper modeling the five voting systems models that will be discussed at these sessions. Understanding Joint Emergency Management (JEM)

It is that time of year again, and for emergency planners that means it is" hurricane season" which runs from the first of June to the end of November. Then we have "flood season", "snow season" and "fire season" just to name a few. How do you get ready for all of these potential events? Well, the Halifax region has an emergency management office that works to prepare the municipality overall, but how do communities like the one you live in get prepared? Around 2001 the region started establishing local emergency management planning groups to do just that. Today they are called Joint Emergency Management Teams, or JEMs for short. They work to help communities and neighbourhoods get ready for any type of major event that could occur in the local area. There is a JEM team in your area, called the Western Region JEM team. The Western Region JEM team is made up of local people from your community working with EMO so that the area is better able to cope during and after a major event. Every JEM team's area is defined as a series of established communities and then it is subdivided into smaller areas in order to do more detailed planning and analysis. This includes profiling each area to identify special populations that will have specific needs in an emergency as well as local hazards and other features. The profiling also includes identifying local facilities that could be used as shelters or comfort centres should the need arise.

The JEM team does planning and training so that they can assist the region after a crisis to meet the needs of the local community. The JEM forms a critical link in the information chain between your neighbourhood and the Halifax region.

The JEM team has several areas that they focus on, namely: **Preparedness:** Which helps the local community get ready for an emergency

Public Education: Where JEM volunteers set up information tables at local public events to engage residents in discussions around becoming more prepared at an individual and family level Community Status Reporters: Which are people in the JEM area who from the safety of their home, collect important information



about the event and pass it along to the JEM team.

Comfort Centre Coordination: The JEM team helps to determine the need for and the location of local comfort centres during an emergency event as well as ensuring they are properly staffed and run.

JEM Support Centre: Operates from a central facility in the JEM area after an emergency event so as to coordinate the tasks that EMO has assigned to the JEM team.

The JEM teams are made up of people from your community, working in your community to help you and your community become better able to respond to and recover from any number of major emergencies.

Additionally some of our core staff members have been through the Comfort Centre Coordination training and are ready to be called upon should an emergency event happen within JEM's Western Region.


