
We hope you will join us for Paint Day, a community celebration for all to attend and the opportunity to create the art work and install the movie screen.

#### The New Horizons for Seniors Program

The New Horizons for Seniors program is a grant funded by our federal government, focused on programming that promotes volunteerism among seniors and engages seniors in the community through the mentoring of others, supporting the social participation and inclusion of seniors. In October, the ROC partnered with the Village Green Recreation Society to submit a grant proposal that would enable senior community champions to deliver an event each month in their home community. The event would include an activity and a light, healthy meal, and would be open to all seniors in the Prospect Communities. Our Member of Parliament, Bernadette Jordan contacted the ROC with the great news that we were successful in our application, and we're ready to get started!

We have funding for a monthly session, to be held in differing locations throughout the Prospect Communities. There are some requirements; the program must be planned and delivered by seniors, and the location must have suitable kitchen facilities that comply with NS Food Safety regulations. At each session, there must be a trained First Aider, and someone trained in Safe Food Handling must be in charge of the meal preparation. Part of the grant allows for that kind of training and the ROC will organize those sessions for the approved number of senior volunteers in

April/May. If you are also a member of a local organization who requires that kind of certification, consider becoming involved!

Jessica Morrissey, Programs and Events Manager, and Shirley Jollimore, Executive Director, have visited with our local seniors groups to spread the word and we've had several parties step up to volunteer for particular months already!

#### **Successful Blanket Exercise Builds Awareness of First Nations History**

"Eye- opening." "Heart- breaking." "Powerful." "I didn't know this." "How painful." "Everyone should do this and learn the true history." "Children should learn this in school." "I'm ashamed of our governments." These are a few of the comments from a group of 30 area residents gathered in a talking circle at St James' United Church on a recent Saturday afternoon. They had just participated in a learning experience known as the Blanket Exercise, designed to tell the history of the indigenous people who have lived here for 14,000 years and the coming of the European settlers who colonized the land. By taking on the role of the indigenous people, listening to and experiencing symbolically the impacts of the settlers' actions and edicts, participants grew in awareness of the reality of the painful hidden history of Canada. Stolen land, treaties dishonoured by governments, diseases deliberately inflicted that decimated populations, The Indian Act that brought independent nations under the control of the federal government, residential schools -these are some of those painful realities. Despite this, the talking circle ended on a note of hope and commitment to learning and healing.

The circle was introduced by Catherine Martin of Blind Bay. Catherine is a Mi'kmaq filmmaker who has been the Nancy's Chair of Womens' Studies at MSVU for the past two years. Burning sweet grass, sage, cedar, and tobacco, Catherine ceremonially smudged each of us before we began the blanket exercise itself; she sang and drummed at beginning and end of the afternoon. With Catherine were Mary, Doug and Elna who have been leading this exercise for several years in Halifax on behalf of KAIROS, a Greek word used in the New Testament meaning "Now is the Time." KAIROS is the name given to the Canadian Ecumenical Justice Initiative, a national church organization which first developed the blanket exercise some 20 years ago in partnership with indigenous peoples.

This event was organized by a group from the local churches in partnership with Catherine, who have come together to work on the goal of reconciliation among residents, indigenous and non-



indigenous, as a project for Canada 150 observations. The Truth and Reconciliation Commission, which heard testimony about the Residential Schools over five years, presented a list of 94 recommendations for the people and governments of Canada to work on so that there might be genuine justice, understanding, healing and peace in this land.

The group plans to hold further Blanket Exercises in the coming months; you can discover why it has that name! Also planned are other opportunities to learn the history of our particular area, to hike the places that have held spiritual significance for the Mi'kmaq over thousands of years, and to come together for enjoyment and appreciation of each other. So please be on the lookout for further announcements though the local churches, PRCC and ROC. Meanwhile, as you drive the Prospect Road think about this: you are travelling on an ancient trail traversing forest and swamp, beside rivers, lakes and ocean that sustained life long before the white man came to this land.

#### **New Playground for Seaview Community Park**

Seaview Community Park on Prospect Bay Road is getting a new playground!

The park is one of a dozen within the Halifax Regional Municipality that will soon have its playground equipment upgraded and replaced. HRM has allocated \$75,000 toward the Prospect area park.

When community members heard that HRM was doing work on the park, they banded together and contacted Councillor Stephen Adams. They wanted to give their input into what the new playground might look like. Several people in the community expressed a desire to see a more natural-type playground, one with more wood and less plastic.

HRM listened. Cobequid Consulting, which tries to incorporate natural playscape elements into playgrounds, was recently awarded the contract to replace the park's current playground equipment. Work is expected to begin soon.

Some community members have also expressed a desire to see the tennis court at Seaview Community Park upgraded. Currently the tennis court is not being used for tennis matches. It requires a new

net and line painting before people can play again.

The Prospect Peninsula Residents' Association has applied for a grant from the Prospect Road Recreation Association. If awarded a grant, the money would be used to upgrade the tennis court this summer.



#### **Exciting New Displays at SS Atlantic Heritage Park**

This month 143 years ago, the Prospect Bay area was in an uproar as some 550 people perished on our shores and over 400 of the living had to be rescued, sheltered, clothed and fed before being sent off to their destinations in the United States. On April 1, Nova Scotia's worst shipwreck occurred when the steamship Atlantic ran ashore on Mosher's Island off Lower Prospect.

The people of the communities of Lower Prospect, Terence Bay and Prospect Village rose to the occasion, with much heroism and kindness being shown to the living and respect to the dead, more than 400 of whom lie buried in the area.

The SS Atlantic Heritage Park exists to honour the memory of this significant event. Located in Terence Bay near the burial site of 277 victims, it provides a quiet place to walk, reflect, enjoy a cup of tea or coffee, and learn about the disaster at the Heritage Centre, artifacts pertaining to the incident are housed.

We have had several exciting donations of artifacts that will be displayed when we open on the Victoria Day weekend. The clock from the chart room came to us last year, and is a very important artifact that still works. It would have been next to the helmsman as he steered the ship while the lookouts searched for the Sambro light to guide them into Halifax. The captain had left orders to be called at 3 A.M. but with no light in sight he was left to sleep and the Atlantic struck the rocks.

Last fall we came into possession of the name board from the ship. It is an elaborately carved wooden piece, eleven feet long, and displays the Atlantic's name in the original paint. It spent the past fifty years above the fireplace of a house in Indian Harbour and now hangs on the wall of the Heritage Centre. It's worth seeing!

We also received the collection of a scuba diver who was active in locating artifacts from the wreck site and elsewhere over a twenty-five year period. It includes a bronze decorative piece that was given to a



young man by his grandmother in 1917, just days after the Halifax Explosion. There are also personal articles such as thimbles, lice combs, a straight razor, jewellery and other items.

The collection also includes materials such as song sheets, promotional materials for the Atlantic, and photographs.

Over the past couple of years, we have been doing additional research on the Atlantic and have gained a better understanding of what happened on that terrible night. We have new insights into the part played by local people in rescuing the survivors. We have been tracking down the descendents of those heroic folk and it has been exciting to share with them details about how their great great grandparents saved survivors from sure death.

#### **Runoff and Play!**

The Prospect Road Community Centre is partnering with Clean Foundation (<a href="www.clean.ns.ca">www.clean.ns.ca</a>) and HRM to build a green, natural playground on the PRCC property. Thanks in large part to a generous grant from TD Friends of the Environment Foundation, this special playground will not only be a fun place for our children and youth to connect to nature, but it will also act as a demonstration site for stormwater mitigation and climate change adaptation options for other community centres and groups.

What's stormwater? When it rains, water can't soak into surfaces like driveways and roads – instead it runs off into streets and storm sewers, and takes with it pollutants like oils, fertilizers, salt, dirt and garbage, a lot of which end up in local waterways. Minor landscaping changes can drastically help manage stormwater, helping to minimize the impact on lakes and streams and allowing rainwater to soak into the ground and recharge our groundwater aquifers. Not only can you reduce the potential of flooding on your property, you can also harvest rainwater for your gardens.

Each stormwater mitigation feature built into the playground will include an information display beside it describing the feature, materials used, best uses for the particular feature and references to sources to help community members start their own projects at home. Natural playgrounds are becoming more common around Nova Scotia, and for good reason. They are designed to utilize the natural features of an area so that we don't need to use as much plastic and metal as other playgrounds. Not only does this make playground features that are accessible to a wide range of ages and abilities (by using a hill slope rather than stairs, for example), but it also creates natural




places for kids to have fun while re-connecting with nature. We have a few ideas for what to include in the playground, such as a slide built into the hill, tree stumps to climb on, and a 'bear's den' or cave built into the hill. But we'll also be asking for your input and help to help design and build the playground. This will include a kids' consultation to ensure that the playground design meets their needs and is actually fun to play on!

Start thinking about what kind of playground features you and your family would like to see. To view other examples of natural playgrounds in the province, check out the Londonderry Play Forest, the Nature Play Space in Middle Musquodoboit, or the Earthscape playground in Halifax at Sir Sanford Fleming Park ('the Dingle').

#### **Route 333 Refugee Sponsorship Association**

It's hard to believe that more than a year has passed since the community came together to form Route 333 Refugee Sponsorship Association.

A lot has happened since then. We are close to welcoming a Syrian refugee family to Canada. The family we are sponsoring cleared the Canadian government's security checks and have had an interview with Canadian visa officials. Our hope is that they will arrive in Halifax sometime this spring.

We have been in contact with the family via social media and they are anxious to come to Halifax. They are a family of three - a widowed mother and her two daughters, who are in their early 20s. They are currently living in Lebanon. While they are safer there than if they had remained in Syria, they remain fearful. Their lives are on hold. They have no legal status, and have little more than one suitcase each of personal belongings. They have been through the horrors of war.

One of the daughters studied English literature at university, but was forced to quit when war broke out. Her hope is to return to school in Canada and complete her degree. She speaks some English. The other daughter is a skilled seamstress. They are eager to start new lives in Canada.

We would like to extend our sincerest thanks to everyone in the community who helped us raise \$20,000 to help support this family during their first year in Canada. Special thanks to several local businesses, the Prospect Peninsula Residents' Association, the Prospect Players, New Life Community Church, the Anglican Diocese of Nova Scotia and PEI, Atlantic Memorial Terence Bay, Brookside Junior High, Prospect Road Elementary and Halifax West



schools, the ROC, and to everyone else who gave whatever they could to help.

We are now working in partnership with the Archdiocese of Halifax-Yarmouth and the Halef family, the owners of Halifax Exhibition Centre, to sponsor the family through the federal government's private refugee sponsorship program.

Thank you from all of us at Route 333 Refugee Sponsorship Association. Together we are making a world of difference for one family.



#### PROGRESS IN HEALTH CARE DELIVERY

It is no surprise to residents of the Prospect Road Communities that one of the most talked about topics in our province revolves around timely access to quality health care and the myriad of issues related to this topic. These are complex issues, not just for our local ridings of Chester-St. Margaret's and Prospect-Timberlea, but indeed for all of Nova Scotia.

One of the many issues concerns Premier Stephen McNeil's promise to amalgamate the nine regional health authorities into a new Nova Scotia Health Authority (NSHA). The Premier delivered on that promise early in his Liberal government's first mandate.

There is lots of good news to share regarding successes by the NSHA in its first year of operation.

- » 700 more Nova Scotians had hip and knee surgeries because better efficiencies were achieved with operating rooms.
- » More than 700 additional Nova Scotians received MRI scans than in the previous year.
- » Fewer people are waiting for home support services and long-term care.
- » Savings of \$70 million per year were found and there are opportunities for more savings.
- » The recent 10-year agreement between Nova Scotia and the federal government will allow the NSHA to improve home care and mental health services for Nova Scotians

We still have many more issues to face in delivering top drawer health care in Nova Scotia. We have to face aging facilities, we must provide some centralized services at a more convenient and less expensive location than downtown Halifax, and we have to continue the successful efforts for process improvement by implementing best practices from the former regional health authorities and by observing what is working in other jurisdictions.

There is still much to be done, more than any provincial government can accomplish in a single term in office. Your Liberal government has made significant progress and with your support it will continue this progress in its second term. It's being done with one thing in mind, improving the health of Nova Scotians and making sure the system is there when needed.
