News from the ROC Executive Director (... Continued)

It's been a great year for us, at the board level. We've completed our strategic plan, which sets some high-level goals for our organization for the next couple of years. Take a look at it online; we have some plans that will need community support, and we would love your input. Here are a few of the strategic goals we will be focusing on over the next few months:

Community Transit: We're re-opening the conversation about community transit; what do we need, what will the community support, and how do we advocate for it? We've done some learning from other community transit groups in rural areas, to see how their models work, and what their journeys have taught them. We also have information from our own transit project a few years ago. Keep an eye out for more details as we work through a process to hear from you about what level of transit you're willing to support in the community. It's a challenging issue, but one that gets a lot of conversation happening, so it's worth delving into.

Youth Engagement: In late February, the ROC was designated an 'Open Award Centre' for the Duke of Edinburgh Award. This prestigious program encourages self-directed leadership and learning for youth ages 14-24. Many people work on award

levels through a school or community group, but it is something an individual can do on their own as well.

We also know that there are a number of local youth who started the program but left the affiliated community group they were tied to, and may still want to continue. Our designation allows those independent participants to connect to the program through the ROC/PRCC, and I have recently completed the training and been certified as an Award Leader to ensure participants have the opportunity to complete their program if they so choose. I will be contacting those independent participants through the month of March to see where they are in their journey, and if they wish to continue. Additionally we will host an information session with staff from the Nova Scotia Duke of Edinburgh office later this spring for potential new participants. We would love to hear from community members who may be able to offer guidance for skill building, community service and adventurous journey components. Please reach out to executivedirector@prospectcommunities. com if you're willing to mentor participants through any of the levels or components of the award.

Partnerships and Connections: We believe in community over competition; there is strength and innovation in partnerships, and we believe that community development and collaboration

starts with sharing information. To achieve this we're developing a regular roundtable that invites groups and organizations in the Prospect Communities to come together, share news of their projects, events, challenges and volunteer opportunities. Our hope is that this will provide local organizations the opportunity to collaborate, learn, share expertise and resources and to better support one another, further strengthening the Prospect Communities. This will be a casual, monthly gathering at the PRCC, possibly rotating locations. If you're interested in participating, please let me know and I'll add you to the email list! Finally, our annual general meeting for the ROC will be held on Monday, June 11 at the PRCC. We'll be celebrating a great year for the board. This year the ROC will also celebrate our 20th Anniversary as an organization. Plans are in motion to celebrate this major milestone - stay tuned for details!

As I approach the close of my second year with the ROC, I am so grateful for those before me whose hard work built the organization, for the ongoing support of our board members, and for our dedicated staff.

Recreation for Mental Health

The ROC/PRCC understands that recreation and socialization within a community is incredibly important for both the physical and mental health of its residents. Over the past year, the ROC management team has participated in a pilot training program called Recreation for Mental Health. Through this learning, we have identified barriers that may stop someone from participating in the recreation we offer due to, but not limited to, a mental health issue.

We have been working hard to reduce and eliminate these barriers in the hopes to better support the Prospect Communities and eliminate the stigma associated with mental health.

One of the barriers people often experience is anxiety related to not knowing what to expect or do when attending a program. We have worked to reduce this by adding additional details to the program descriptions on our website. You will now find that the description includes the instructor's name, what you will need to wear, gear that you need to bring as well as the room that the program is located in.

We're hopeful that eventually, we will also be able to offer a virtual tour of the facility so that people can familiarize themselves with the building before they arrive on site.



Prospect Road Community Garden

Located at the Prospect Road Community Centre are twelve garden beds. They are maintained by community residents and volunteers, providing places for growing local, healthy and affordable foods. Community gardens encourage self-reliance and social interaction, bringing you closer to the community while meeting neighbours. The garden provides an opportunity for recreation and exercise, all while producing nutritious food.

The garden beds are located within a fenced in area and a water tap, hose, composter, and shed are available for storage of equipment. Garden season opens in May through harvest time up until October and beds are available for use for a plot fee of \$30 per season.

The members come together to meet a minimum of twice per year; at the opening and closing of the gardening season. The meetings allows members to share and learn tips on planting, harvesting and other gardening techniques shared from their fellow garden members.

Several women in the Prospect area are carrying on a long tradition of making beautiful handmade quilts for their families and friends.

Recently, a small group of women led by Prospect resident Ellen Ryan, completed a colourful quilt, designed with various flowers, including tulips, lilies, and sunflowers. The women donated the quilt to the Prospect Peninsula Residents' Association (PPRA) with the goal of raising money to help the community.

Tickets for the quilt are now on sale. They cost \$2 per ticket or three tickets for \$5. To buy tickets you can call Ellen at 852-2285. If ticket sales go well, a draw for the quilt will be held at the PPRA's annual general meeting on April 20 at the Prospect Bay Children's Centre. Otherwise, a draw will be held later in the year.

All the money raised from the ticket sales will go to the PPRA, a grassroots, community organization, the PPRA was formed in March of 1983 with a focus to bring people in the community together. Everyone who lives on the Prospect Peninsula (basically the Prospect Bay Road and surrounding area) can belong.

To continue its long tradition of helping people in the community, supporting refugees, and holding free events like its annual Canada Day celebrations in Prospect Village, the PPRA needs to raise several thousand dollars. Most of the money raised will go toward

paying for insurance on the community wharf located at the end of Prospect Bay Road. Available to everyone in the community for boating and swimming, the PPRA maintains liability insurance on the wharf.

Please support the PPRA. We'd love to hear from you too. There are lots of ways you can get involved



and make a difference in the community. We will be holding our annual general meeting on April 20, as well as a community garbage clean up in the spring. Last year, several community members did an amazing job cleaning up the ditches along Prospect Bay Road and surrounding area.

Paid Advertisemen



The Prospect Communities experienced a number of major storm events in late December and early January, resulting in widespread power outages. Many of these outages lasted several days and were compounded by extremely cold weather and the potential for storm surges and coastal flooding. During these storm events the Halifax Regional Municipality (HRM) Emergency Management Organization (EMO) supported various communities by opening Comfort Centres.

The primary function of these Comfort Centres is to provide comfort to persons suffering short term discomfort resulting from the stresses imposed by abnormal situations and events, such as loss of power and heat. Generally Comfort Centres operate for short periods of time, either for a day or over a few days, closing in the evening, and events that require evacuation or overnight stays would be operated by the Red Cross as an emergency shelter – often with the assistance of the Comfort Centre staff and volunteers.

HRM is quite a large area in terms of geography, and EMO has created Regional Joint Emergency Management teams. known as JEM teams, to locally manage and assist in emergency situations. The Prospect Communities, in addition to Timberlea, Tantallon, Hubbards and Peggy's Cove belong to the Western Region JEM or WRJEM. Locally, the JEM team is managed by a volunteer executive board consisting of a Chair, Vice Chair, and Secretary. While each JEM team operates independently, there are a number of core functions that are performed under the direction and coordination of a volunteer JEM Council.

The recent events demonstrated the need to bring attention to local Comfort Centres and the related information so that the community is better informed in the future. The Western Region JEM has identified several locations that have the potential to act as Comfort Centres should the

need arise. Typically these are located in municipally owned buildings due to HRM's ability to quickly access the facilities. Because each emergency situation is unique, there is no standard, one size fits all location. Instead decisions are based on the location of the event, the services required by the community and which facility can best accommodate those needs. Locally various options have been identified including the Prospect Road Community Centre, and some local churches and businesses.

There are various ways to find information about Comfort Centres:

The feedback we received in response to the recent comfort centres is that not everyone is able to access information regarding local responses as, in the case of a power outage, not everyone has access to the internet or telephone services. The JEM team is using this feedback to investigate means of improved communication.

JEM/EMO recommends that you should be prepared to support yourself and your family for 72 hours in the event of emergency. This means having enough medication, food, water, batteries, flashlights, alternate heat sources, and cash on hand. Wind up or battery operated radios are helpful to stay up to date on weather conditions as well as emergency responses, alerts and information. Know your neighbourhood and look out for your neighbours, especially those who are vunerable; stay in contact and help keep them informed.

The success of the WRJEM is dependent on engaged volunteers. We need members from the communities we serve and it is important for each community to be represented and learn more about being prepared for and responding to an emergency when it occurs. Did you know?

The Prospect Road Community Centre is owned by HRM but operated by the Resource Opportunities Centre, a local not for profit organization. The PRCC is one of the possible locations for a Comfort Centre should the need arise. As such, the ROC's entire management team has received Comfort Centre Manager training and I-100 Introduction to Incident Command Systems, in addition to a few members of the volunteer board, and are active volunteers within WRJEM.

Why is this important?

This means that in the event of an emergency, the people responsible to open and operate a Comfort Centre at the PRCC are located within close proximity to the facility, and can transition from Community Centre to Comfort Centre operations quickly and efficiently.

It is important to note that our team is not bound to the PRCC location alone; they can be asked to support Comfort Centre operations at any location within the WRJEM, which would provide additional experience and learning opportunities.

Our Recent Comfort Centre Operations:

Under the direction of the Nova Scotia EMO, the PRCC did operate as a Comfort Centre on a few occasions in December and January. These events provided an amazing learning opportunity and a chance for our team to practice our skills. The January 4th event, brought 48 people of various ages to the facility. As the PRCC is equipped with a backup generator we were able to offer a hot shower, warm drink, snacks, and device charging.

You may have noticed that the PRCC suspended regular operations during this time. We will always evaluate what is scheduled to be happening in the facility with what is needed by the community and do our best to allow our regular rentals and programming to proceed as planned. Depending on the circumstances this may not always be possible. This is due to the fact that, upon conversion to a Comfort Centre, our trained staff members become JEM staff/volunteers and are operating under the direction of WRJEM via NS EMO, and under their insurance protections.

The Prospect Communities Farmers Market - Season 2!

Our small but mighty market team has spent the winter months planning for season 2 of the Prospect Communities Farmers Market! It's hard to believe that our market had over 4200 visitors last season and provided 245 vendor spaces over 14 markets and we have lots of plans to make season 2 bigger and better.

The Farmers Market is an initiative of the Resource Opportunities Centre (ROC) and is operated out of the Prospect Road Community Centre. The Market provides an avenue for residents to access fresh Nova Scotia farm produce, prepared foods and local crafts within the Prospect Communities, and supports the ROC's vision of encouraging and promoting a welcoming, innovative and thriving community.

Same space - new time!

This year we will continue to operate the market on bi-weekly Sundays, beginning on Sunday, May 6th in the multi-purpose room of the Prospect Road Community Centre. Based on vendor and community feedback we have decided to move the market hours ahead by one hour. We're hopeful that the new time slot of 11am to 3pm will encourage more community members to come and check out the local produce and handcrafted items that our amazing vendors offer.

We're looking for help – our market team is looking for volunteers! The market provides unique volunteer opportunities and this year we are looking to add an Assistant Market Coordinator, Live Music Coordinator as well as additional Guests Counters/Greeters to our team.



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Catherine Martin of Blind Bay - Appointed to the Order of Canada

Hearty congratulations are due to one of our neighbours; Catherine Martin of Blind Bay has been appointed to the Order of Canada. While the announcement was made late in 2017, Catherine has yet to attend an awards ceremony in Ottawa. Many residents will recall Catherine drumming and performing a smudging ceremony at the opening of the PRCC.

Catherine is a highly respected Mi'kmaw Elder, a member of the Millbrook First Nation in Truro, an independent producer, director, writer, facilitator, communications consultant, drummer and the first woman Mi'kmaw filmmaker from the Atlantic Region. The Order of Canada recognizes her outstanding achievements in these fields and her particular commitment to education among the women and children of indigenous communities. In addition, Catherine has devoted energy to educating the settler community about Mi'kmaw culture and the realities of the history of Canada. She has held teaching positions at various universities and colleges.

Some residents experienced Catherine's leadership at the Blanket Exercises held last year in St James' and St Joseph's churches. Developed by KAIROS, the national church justice organization, the Blanket Exercise teaches the history of colonization, revealing the injustices and racism upon which

Canada was founded. Catherine has been generous with her time and perspective on many occasions throughout the province. Righting relationships through knowledge and understanding are close to her heart. In 2015, Catherine began a two year appointment as the Nancy's Chair in Women's Studies at Mount Saint Vincent University. There, she gave leadership in decolonizing the nature of education, introducing further diversity in the ethos, courses and personnel of the university. She was instrumental in organizing the art installation of beautiful moccasin vamps commemorating the missing and murdered indigenous women and girls displayed at MSVU art gallery, leading ceremonies and caring for families. I was fortunate to experience both the powerful opening and this moving art show. Recently, Catherine ensured that the hearings of the Commission on Murdered and Missing Indigenous Girls and Women in Cape Breton took place in a respectful, culturallyappropriate environment with supportive healing resources available to the grieving families.

Catherine has lived here since 1982, first in White's Lake, then in Blind Bay. Soon after her arrival, as Bayview subdivision was being developed, an ancient burial site was unearthed. She is still riled that the government would not finance an archaeological dig of this important site. Fortunately, she obtained funding from the



Union of Nova Scotian Indians. Precious artifacts from her distant ancestors were saved from careless demolition to be preserved in the NS Museum of Natural History.

Among Catherine's current film projects is a documentary about the Mi'kmaw women of Boat Harbour who worked with scientists to corroborate their suspicions that it was the effluent from the Pictou pulp mill that was causing illness among their community.





Burying the SS Atlantic's Dead

The grounding of the Atlantic on April 1, 1873 presented authorities with many problems, not the least of which was the dead bodies. John Sheridan's and Alfred Larder's team of 10 divers complained that the bodies got in the way of salvaging the cargo, while newspapers complained that the remains of loved ones were considered a nuisance and of no value. White Star Line was finally embarrassed into paying to have the bodies recovered—fifty dollars for cabin class and twenty for steerage. Retrieving those in cabin class was more time consuming and dangerous, so they cost more.

About five hundred would not be claimed. Some had no family in North America and others could not afford to travel to Halifax or ship the bodies home. They remained in Nova Scotia.

While Magistrates Edmund Ryan of Lower Prospect and George Longard of Prospect worked at identifying bodies, coffins were built at Cunard's wharves and the first two hundred sent to Lower Prospect aboard the schooner Amateur.

Ships' flags flew in the harbour at half mast as the bodies of officers Henry Metcalfe and Ambrose Worthington were buried in Camp Hill Cemetery. Cabin class passengers were sealed into metal coffins and shipped out to relatives. Reverend William Ancient, the pastor at St. Paul's church in Terence Bay, offered space near the Anglican Cemetery. James Morrow, the Halifax representative of

the White Star Line, accepted.

Boatloads of corpses wound their way among the narrow channels around Ryan's Island, past Lower Prospect and along the coast to Tennant Point, where a lighthouse stands today. They went into Terence Bay to the high ground where Reverend Ancient's little church stood until it was struck by lightning and burned in 1942.

On April 6, the diggers began the first long trench, into which coffins were placed, three and four atop one another. Ancient buried sixty-five bodies and three days later another ninety-one. For almost three months it continued until 277 had been laid to rest.

Alongside the road between Terence Bay and Lower Prospect, Reverend Martin Maas, the Roman Catholic priest at Upper Prospect, did the same. It is estimated that he interred some 150 at the Star of the Sea Cemetery.

A photograph of the time, taken by William Chase of Halifax, shows Ancient, his robes buffeted by the relentless winds, standing above the large grave containing many rough coffins, reading the burial service in the presence of a couple of dozen locals, mostly women, with a few men leaning on their shovels—a doleful scene indeed. Nobody knew anybody in the coffins.

Of the more than 400 buried in Lower Prospect and Terence Bay, there is no headstone recalling a name or birthplace. Each cemetery contains a simple granite post with a plaque marking the common grave, erected many years after the wooden markers had gone. The only stone grave marker is in



Camp Hill Cemetery in Halifax, belonging to 23-year-old Ambrose Worthington, the purser.

The burial site for the 277 lies in the SS Atlantic Heritage Park in Terence Bay. It's worth a visit!

Join the SS Atlantic Heritage Park Society on Sunday April 8th to observe the anniversary of the SS Atlantic wreck and rescue on April 1st, 1873.

The Society invites the local communities to the former Terence Bay Fire Hall at 2pm for an afternoon of lively music with local resident Laura O'Hearn and the North Street Straw Band, and storytelling with Bob Chaulk. A small admission fee will apply and tea, coffee and sweets will be available as well as 50/50 draw and raffle. All funds raised will support the operations of the Heritage Park. Watch for additional details throughout the communities as the date draws closer.

Terence Bay Elementary School - Small in Size - Big in Heart!

That's the motto at the Terence Bay site of Atlantic Memorial – Terence Bay School (AMTB).

It's a philosophy that's lived out daily through principles that are nurtured beyond the curriculum; things like kindness and manners. Respect for oneself, for others, and the environment.

And soon, the building will shine as bright on the outside as its students.

Residents of Terence Bay and Lower Prospect are elated that work has begun to restore their beloved school. The site - a heritage landmark since 1960 - has served generations of people, and has been in a state of decline for years.

In the fall, a group of volunteers lobbied a request for resources to improve the school's exterior. In a few short weeks they collected over 1,000 signatures from residents across the Prospect communities, and the provincial government looked favourably upon the project as a worthy investment in rural communities.

Did You Know?

Atlantic Memorial and Terence Bay (AMTB) elementary have been together as one school – two sites for over 20 years, serving the catchment area of White's Lake, Lower

Prospect, Prospect to East Dover.

Were you aware that the Terence Bay site is still in operation?

Did you know you have a choice about where your child attends school? That there are no boundaries and that both sites are accessible to students by bus, no matter where you live?

Both sites have wonderful things to offer. Like nearby Prospect Road Elementary they are safe, positive places with passionate educators that foster the academic, social and emotional needs of students. The AMTB sites integrate regularly with one another at assemblies and class outings, and both have an intentional focus on coastal community culture and heritage.

The most notable difference that sets the Terence Bay site apart from its sister school are its small class sizes.

Misconceptions about the school have contributed to the site's low enrollment. It was believed by many to have closed when the sites became one school. Its exterior decline and a belief that the curriculum is substandard from other schools are also factors.

This simply is not the case.

Ask the parent who teaches elsewhere, but chose to enroll her kids at Terence Bay Elementary. Ask the dad whose son



in primary reads with confidence. Ask the parents of a child with special needs about the school's inclusive environment - about sign language being taught in the classroom so ALL kids can communicate.

Prospect has great schools, and the Terence Bay Elementary site is one of them.

It's small in size, big in heart.

As we navigate the changes to public education in Nova Scotia, it is important to understand the implications they will have on all of us now, and in the future. It is our job as parents to help our kids thrive on their learning journey by making informed decisions about their education. Do your homework. Know your options!

Government has accepted the spirit and intent of the recommendations in Dr. Avis Glaze's report, "Raise the Bar: A Coherent and Responsive Education Administrative System for Nova Scotia."

Will people without education degrees be hired as principals and vice-principals to manage schools?

NO. Principals and vice-principals are, first and foremost, educational leaders in our schools and will continue to be. Dr. Glaze acknowledges that principals should not have to spend time on building maintenance issues. We agree and will act to make sure principals can focus on instructional leadership.

Will the Glaze Report have a positive impact on parents and students?

This report recognizes that every school is unique; that parents, teachers, and administrators need to be able to respond to their community's needs. It recommends that School Advisory Councils have more say, a stronger voice, and funding to make decisions to support local priorities.

Using departmental guidelines and with access to funding, principals and teachers will be empowered to select the text books and learning materials that best support their teaching. Passionate teachers, empowered by relevant, appropriate learning materials will be better able to provide a better learning experience for our students.

As our education system developed, we allowed some of our most important education specialists to get caught up in bureaucracy. That's why we're moving teaching support specialists like literacy leads and math mentors out of regional education offices and into classrooms four days a week. We'll also ensure they have more time for planning and preparation. Ensuring that our teaching support specialists can do the work they love - instead of paperwork - strengthens our classrooms and provides more student support where it's needed.

Teachers and principals know the educational needs of students:

Principals will have more independence to run their school and manage the school in the best interests of students. Teachers and administrators will now have a direct line with the Department of Education to voice their concerns. If we want more of our students to succeed, we need to take action today. A better future for our children means we need to pull together now. Our students' success depends on us working together to build stronger classrooms.
