News from the ROC Executive Director (... Continued)

Over the past few months there have been several meetings of representatives from local community based organizations. This semi-monthly gathering is dubbed The Prospect Communities Round Table, and we welcome any local organization to the table. The purpose is information -sharing, promotion of activities and events, and we hope, fostering relationships that may lead to successful partnerships between organizations. Through this group, the ROC has been piloting a community calendar through www.prospectcommunities.com. Our March meeting featured a presentation by HRM Community Developer Bronwyn Mackinnon on recruiting and retaining volunteers!

We will meet again in May at the PRCC, and suggestions for presentations or guest speakers are welcomed. If you'd like to receive reminders about the Round Table in order to have someone from your organization attend, please contact the email above to be added to the list!

Transportation is a topic that comes up at nearly every community gathering, and certainly invokes a lot of conversation on our local social media pages! One of the ROC's strategic goals as a board is to investigate the possibilities of communitybased transportation options for the Prospect Communities. Our plan is to apply for funding for a feasibility study through the NS Trip program this spring - we're waiting for the applications to open as we speak! That's the first step in the process: market research and inquiry conducted by a neutral third party contractor, to evaluate the support that exists for community-based transit and what might be possible in the community. If we're successful in this application, there would be a professional contracted to conduct the study, which would need to include significant community consultation. A final report would be drafted, and it would be used to instigate a business planning process and advocate for transportation options for the Prospect Road area.

The ROC has been through this process once before. What we learned is that community support will be critical at every step of the journey. Where successful community-based transit options have been implemented elsewhere, there has been evidence to prove that there is sufficient user and volunteer support to operate such a system. As well, during the feasibility study itself, it is really important that the community contributes to the conversation, so that solid recommendations come out of the study that will meet the needs of those who want a transit option. Plainly stated, your voice will be needed to help determine what, if any, transit opportunities exist for our community, and volunteers will be required to move any transit options forward. Whether that's a door-to-door, pre-booked community transit program

similar to BayRides, or advocating with our municipal government for the establishment of transit link routes similar to Tantallon or Sackville, the ROC views itself as a guide in this process, looking to see what options garner community support. If there is an appetite to move forward, our role would be to bring those passionate about transit together to develop a plan to proceed. Once the application for the feasibility study is submitted, it would likely be early fall before a decision is reached and communicated. We'll keep the community informed via our social media channels and our website, and ensure any decision is shared with you as soon as it's received.

You'll find lots of great information in these pages about upcoming programs at the PRCC and other happenings in our communities. We're looking forward to a very busy spring and summer here in Prospect, with the expansion of some of our community meal programs and of course Season 3 of our Farmers' Market. Read on, and mark your calendars! *Happy Spring*!







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HALIFAX RAGGED LAKE COMPOSTING FACILITY COMMUNITY LIAISON COMMITTEE

The Ragged Lake Source Separated Organics Composting Facility at 61 Evergreen Place (Facility) is owned by the Halifax Regional Municipality and is operated by AIM Environmental Group (AIM). In the operation of the Facility, both the Municipality and AIM strive for the Facility to be a good neighbour in the community.

The Facility itself has been designed to minimize potential operational impacts such as odour, noise, dust and traffic. While the Municipality is currently evaluating future long-term options for managing its organic waste materials, it is important the existing Facility be operated safely, compliantly and efficiently; all while minimizing impacts to residents and other stakeholders.

Both the Municipality and AIM recognize the value of residents', businesses' and the general community's participation on Committees and have established a Community Liaison Committee (CLC) to allow for information transfer related to the on-going operations of the Facility. This Committee provides a forum for mutual distribution, consultation, review and exchange of information regarding the operation of the Ragged Lake Composting Facility, including processing of materials, environmental monitoring, maintenance, and complaint resolution.

As with all advisory committees within the Municipality, the CLC does not have the authority to commit the Municipality's resources or direct the work of municipal or contractor staff. The CLC acts in an advisory role to the "*proponent*", which for this Facility is AIM, in partnership with the Municipality who is the Facility and property owner.

The CLC is made up of seven representatives from the local community, HRM and AIM. Current CLC Members are:

Outdoor Multi-sport Court

The outdoor multi-sport court is finally ready for use!

This court has been a long time in the making as one of the phases of the original master plan created in partnership with the original Prospect Road Community Centre Steering Committee, Prospect Road Recreation Association (PRRA) and HRM.

In addition to funds remaining from the original construction phase and dedicated to the sport court project, ongoing contributions from the Prospect Road Recreation Association (PRRA), and additional funding secured by the Resource Opportunities Centre from the Nova Scotia Department of Communities, Culture and Heritage with support from the PRRA our local councillor and MLA, the project was finally ready to move forward. The court was completed in early November and is considered part of HRM capital assets, to be maintained by Parks and Recreation.

The court is enclosed with fencing for safety,

as it is adjacent to the parking lot, and hosts five basketball nets, and two courts painted for pickleball. While it is not quite large enough for regulation tennis, it could be used for tennis or other racquet sports provided there aren't other users on the court.

The court is a bring-your-own-equipment space; there are no balls or racquets available from the PRCC. In the coming weeks, there will be portable nets secured in a locked storage unit next to the court. The key will be available from the front desk of PRCC during regular business hours, and the key needs to be signed out with proof of identification and returned before closing. Nets must be replaced after use, secured in their bags, and the key returned. The nets were part of the grant funding, with no replacements immediately available if they are lost or damaged. If another group comes behind you to use the court, a player from that group will need to sign out the key behind you. The last name on the sign-out will be considered responsible for the key and the nets. We don't recommend passing



the key over without proper sign off. The court is a shared space, and the intent is that sports are played simultaneously. There is a 20-minute play limit if others are waiting to use the court so please judge your timing accordingly, or join efforts and play together!

The court is open in daylight hours only; the parking lot lights don't provide sufficient visibility to be safe for play after dusk. We're seeing lots of use already with the basketball nets this spring, and look forward to continued use of this great new recreation asset!

The Prospect Communities Farmers Market

Season 3 – Sprouting Sunday, June 2nd

The Farmers' Market is back this June at the Prospect Road Community Centre! We've been busy over the winter months consulting with the vendors from previous seasons, the Spryfield & District Community Market and many experts in the farmers' market world, and we're so excited to fill you in on our plans for season 3!

New Time – Same Place!

Last year, market guests told us that they would like the market to start a bit earlier; this year the market will operate from 10:30am-1:30pm, every second Sunday, in the PRCC's multi-purpose room. If you're an early riser, have no fear, the Kitchen Window Café will begin serving breakfast and brunch an hour ahead of the market at 9:30am, giving you the chance to fill your belly and caffeinate accordingly before the market opens.

Additionally, based on guest and vendor feedback, we have decided to delay our opening until early June to ensure that our produce vendors have an adequate amount of fruits and veggies for our hungry community and we will continue to operate every second Sunday until the end of October.

We also continue to maintain our strategic partnership with the Spryfield & District Community Market, operating on opposite Sundays. We encourage you to visit with our neighbouring market during our off weeks.

Vendors

This year we have ambitious goals – to grow both our vendors and guest attendance by 50-100%. Many of our previous vendors have committed to return this season, including our anchor vendors Higbee's Berry Farm (various fruits, veggies, blueberry plants and Cindy's homemade fudge), Mount Denson Blueberry Farm (various berries, fruit, jams, jellies, honey products, eggs, meat) as well as Prospect's own Edible Earth Farm (various salad crops, root veggies & herbs). We're happy to announce that Taproot Farm will return to the Prospect Communities as an official vendor as well.

As a new member of the Farmers' Markets of Nova Scotia Cooperative, we have made a commitment to sell only the highest quality local products and we adhere to a "make it, bake it, grow it" policy. Our café area will also provide space for local musicians, providing entertainment and a wonderful atmosphere as you shop, brunch or people watch. Grab brunch from the Kitchen Window, some sweet treats, hot butter chicken or samosas, grab a seat for you and your neighbor and relax and enjoy.

There will also be opportunities to take in a workshop or two. Stay tuned to our social media accounts for more information.


What Your Support Means To Us:

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WRJEM Western Region Joint Emergency Management Organization Update



A community information meeting was held in November 2018 to discuss plans to develop evacuation plans for communities along the Prospect Road and within the Western Region. Most who attended the meeting understood the importance of establishing evacuation plans and HRM EMO (Emergency Management Organization) requires this information in the event our communities need to be evacuated due to a disaster, such as forest fires, flooding, or any other natural or man-made disaster.

We are in the infancy stages of this work. We have begun gathering information from communities and will start working to get this up and running within the next couple of months. One of our JEM team members has been busy reviewing data for the Greenwood Heights subdivision in the Timberlea area. Several other members will be reaching out to a couple communities along the Prospect Road over the next few weeks. Stay tuned for updates in the coming months. We will also be hosting an information session on May 3 at the PRCC from 5:00 to 6:30 to kick off Emergency Preparedness Week. 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Terence Bay and Lower Prospect Come Alive with Community Spirit!

These Things Matter

For years the communities of Terence Bay and Lower Prospect have been a-buzz with vibrant activity aimed to support not only the interests of community residents, but to preserve and honour the culture and heritage of our seaside gem. A collective of community groups like the SS Atlantic Heritage Society, the Terence Bay Lighthouse Committee, St. Paul's Church, the Terence Bay Playground Committee and the Terence Bay Community Hall Association have been working tirelessly for the values they hold dear spanning in some instances decades – all with a purpose to steward and serve the community they are part of.

Finally, we're now seeing that hard work pay off like never before. Atlantic Memorial Terence Bay School – Terence Bay Site: phase two work on the building concluded this winter – we're now only flower boxes and beautiful new signage away from the exterior upgrades being complete on this important community landmark. The small school site offering small split-size classes is finally shining as bright on the outside as it is on the inside!

The generations of proud residents living in the area and students attending the site alike are elated to see the building restored, and appreciate the province's favourable response to our call of support for this project as a worthy investment in rural communities. Terence Bay Playground – Coming Soon! The small but mighty committee of parents and community members (along with some village little ones) were incredibly active in hosting various fun-filled community events that served to hands-on fundraise over \$10,300 over an eight month period last year. These efforts were largely supported by the community with donations of time and treasure. Without them, this would not have been made possible.

A huge shout out to Grade 9 BJHS student, Landon Hurshman, for his thoughtful donation of a financial gift from his school entrepreneur fair toward these efforts, all for the well-being of our children. THAT's true community spirit!

The committee has also been successful to date in securing \$10,000 in grant funding for the project. Additional provincial and municipal funding options are also being explored to support a new playground that students attending the Terence Bay site of AMTB school helped to inform! We know whole heartedly that the children will be super excited to see the build get underway this fall.



Terence Bay Community Hall (TBCHA) – in the spring of 2018 a newly elected board of directors took on the colossal task of applying to the municipality to take over ownership of the former Terence Bay Fire Hall. We are proud to share that in November we celebrated the municipality's announcement of the building to the TBCHA to care for and steward as a community gathering space well into the future. The board is busy now developing policy, applying for infrastructure funding, improving space efficiency and delivering on programming that's been identified as relevant by the community, with plans to expand and grow what's offered in the space through volunteer engagement. 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Learnings from Kennedy Schofield's Recent Wills Workshop at the Prospect Road Community Centre By Charlotte Edwards and Amanda Lutz

Kennedy Schofield Lawyers recently partnered with the Prospect Road Community Centre to deliver a workshop to community members about Estate Planning. Charlotte Edwards and Amanda Lutz, Associates of the firm, presented on Wills, Powers of Attorney and Advanced Health Care Directives. Charlotte and Amanda responded to many questions and below are some of the responses that surprised people the most;

Q: If I do not have a Will, will my commonlaw partner get everything?

A: If you do not have a Will the Intestate Succession Act applies and it lists who inherits from your Estate, in order of priority. A common-law partner is not listed in the legislation and they do not fall under the definition of a spouse in this provincial Act.

Q: Should both my kids be my Executors?

A: Generally making two people co-executors can pose problems as they both need to sign all documents, and need to be able to work together. If you are concerned about not naming both kids, you can always list one as an alternate Executor. Being an Executor is a lot of work. No child will stay mad for long once they see what is involved.

Q: Is a Power of Attorney and Executor the same thing?

A: A Power of Attorney is appointed by you and has the ability to act on your behalf and make financial decisions, as prescribed in the document, while you are alive. An Executor is appointed under your Will and carries out your last wishes once you are deceased.

Q: I have a Will from another country, will it work here?

A: Wills are governed by provincial law. A Will drafted in another province or country should be reviewed by a lawyer to ensure it meets the legal requirements in Nova Scotia. It is important for your Will to be current. If there have been life changes, like a move of province or country, you may need to meet with a lawyer to ensure your Will reflects your last wishes.

Prospect Road Community Garden

Located at the *Prospect Road Community Centre* are twelve garden beds. They are maintained by community residents and volunteers, providing places for growing local, healthy and affordable foods. Community gardens encourage self-reliance and social interaction, bringing you closer to the community while meeting neighbours. The garden provides an opportunity for recreation and exercise, all while producing nutritious food.

The garden beds are located within a fenced in area and a water tap, hose, composter, and shed are available for storage of equipment. Garden season typically opens in May through harvest time up until October and beds are available for use for a plot fee of \$30 per season.

The members come together to meet a minimum of twice per year; at the opening and closing of the gardening season. The meetings allows members to share and learn tips on planting, harvesting and other gardening techniques shared from their fellow garden members.

Timberlea-Prospect Constituency News- Spring 2019 Investing in Projects that Improve the Quality of Living in the Prospect Communities

I am proud to present the Prospect Road communities an update on the continued plan to invest in projects that have been enhancing infrastructure, promoting active living, and continuously improving the quality of living along our many diverse communities. After several months of knocking on doors, and engaging in conversations with residents over the summer and fall, I'm confident the programs our government is investing in and implementing, in addition to projects I have procured for our community, will benefit the safety, convenience, and overall quality of life within the Prospect Road communities.

Capital Investment in Roads

The increased volume of traffic heading in and out of the downtown core coupled with a structure that is nearing the end of its service, prompted a significant capital investment into 102/103 interchange. Originally known as the **Prospect Road Interchange Overpass**, this structure built in 1963 is receiving a significant investment of **\$32.8** million dollars to redesign, reconstruct, and improve the daily flow of traffic in and out of the city.

In the latest installment of turning lanes along Prospect Rd I was able to secure funding in the amount of **\$1.36** million to improve the traffic flow closer to home for the installation of four new intersections by the Prospect Road Community Center. An additional **\$1.7** million was also allocated to our community for the expansion of the Truck 3 intersection where St Margaret's Bay Road and Bayer's Lake Park connect. Again, improving important infrastructure of heavily travelled areas in our community.

Active Transportation (Bicycle Lanes)

My next area of focus lead me to securing funds for the Improvement in transportation of active modes of transport. As I heard from many residents, the enjoyment of cycling would be enhanced if a safe, comfortable, continuous route leading to our picturesque coastal line was available. With this in mind and in an effort to encourage participation in a healthy active lifestyle I was able to secure funding to incorporate paved shoulders (as known as active transportation lanes) on Highway 333 for cyclists. This project will begin this summer from Goodwood up to the Community Centre area and will be annually revisited during capital planning.

Day Care

Making sure the families in our community have access to affordable child care is important for healthy growth and development of our children. Quality child care is an essential support system that benefits families economically, socially, and educationally and allows parents to earn a living for their family. For these reasons, the provincial and federal government have teamed up to infuse a **\$35** million dollars into child care for our province. I am pleased to share with you The Friends for Life Child Care Centre approval for a \$50,000 expansion that will

provide spaces for 18 more toddlers.
