# News from the ROC Executive Director (...Continued )

Our board has come to the end of the strategic plan that it began in 2016, and is now in the early stages of developing a new five-year strategy for the organization. Part of that will be speaking with community, likely via an electronic survey, to hear what you think priorities should be for our community. Our board will take that feedback, along with trends in areas that align with our vision and mission, and develop goals to work on over the next three to five years. We'll be working with HRM Community Developer, Bronwyn Mackinnon to get this important planning activity completed, but we can't do it without your help. We'll publicize the link to the survey, and if you need assistance filling it in we can use the public computers at PRCC to help you.

The board is still waiting to hear back on the application for funding for a feasibility study around community-based transit. We expect to hear something very soon! Feedback from the community on the options that would be supported will be a critical part of this process, so if the funding is approved, our social media channels will host information and staff at the PRCC will be informed so you don't miss an opportunity to share your opinion on what would work best in the Prospect Communities, and what type of transit you would support.

The ROC holds a seat on the Chebucto West Community Health Board (CWCHB), where we share the prospective of the Prospect Communities. The Health Board is working on three main priorities over the next two years. The first, supporting the development of a local food security policy, has been an ongoing project in partnership with the Halifax Food Policy Alliance and the Halifax Community Health Board, and they are developing a primer for the federal election, to empower voters to engage their candidates in doorstep discussions about food security concerns in our local areas. Look for that in your mailboxes in September. The next priorities they've identified for work over the next couple of years include homelessness and mental health services. They're in the process of developing action items and you can follow the progress on those issues via the Chebucto West Community Health Board Facebook page.

Finally, the ROC board holds a position on the Western Commons Advisory Committee. The trail access to the Western Common Wilderness Common behind the PRCC is still officially closed, as the trail is still under construction. The Advisory Committee, empowered only to make recommendations to Community Council. is working with Parks and Recreation to determine the best way to cross the Nichols Lake/McDonald Lake waterway, and HRM contracted a consultant to study what would be required and make recommendations. They are looking at all possible options. A decision needs to be made on what the next phase of trail development will be, to determine the type of water crossing

required in that area. If the bridge needs to host construction equipment and materials, it will require a larger, sturdier, more expensive crossing. If the decision is made to begin trail development through another location, then possibly a different type of crossing can be utilized. 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## **The Goodwood Beautification Project**

The Goodwood Beautification Project committee came together in fall 2018 to look at the possibility of partnering with local governments and businesses to improve the visual appearance of the industrial stretch in Goodwood along the Prospect Road. The timing was perfect; road improvements from Evergreen Place to the Prospect Road Community Centre were planned for the summer and created an opportunity to improve the roadside esthetic.

Local residents Maureen Yeadon, Brookside; Bob Dooley, Goodwood; Frank Johnston, Goodwood, and Shirley Jollimore, Executive Director of the Resource Opportunties Centre, met with representatives from Transportation and Infrastructure Renewal (TIR) to determine what might be possible and to explore funding opportunities. The committee applied successfully for funding through the NS Department of Municipal Affairs, with support from MLA Iain Rankin, and to the Capital District Fund through Councilor Stephen Adams to make roadside enhancements at what is considered the gateway to the province's most visited tourist attraction.

Thousands of tourists pass through the Prospect Communities each year en route to Peggy's Cove and the many other notable tourist destinations we are so lucky to have in our backyards. The Committee believes that enhancing the roadside will increase interest in local businesses, artists and events and encourage travelers to stop by rather than driving straight through to their end destination.

While these kind of improvements need to be phased in over a couple of years, the immediate focus is the entrance to Mills Drive. Working with landscape design consultants at Talisman Technical Solutions, a design in keeping with the local environment and incorporating native stone and plants will see the installation of new signage and a natural garden space on the corner of Mills Drive and Prospect Road, as well as some native plantings along the road leading up to Mills Drive. An art installation designed by metalsmith Al Simm will be installed adjacent to the Twin Cities Insulation property, and will reflect our seaside heritage. Native plants are being supplied by local gardener, Barb Allen.

The committee has recently been approached by several businesses located within the Mills Drive industrial area including C&D Recycling, Wil-Mac Self-Storage, and John Ross & Sons. They will engage their fellow business colleagues in the area, and appoint a representative to join our committee to work collaboratively with us on the planned improvements. The vision is one that is natural and not industrial, reflecting the



culture and environment of the Prospect Communities and our seaside heritage. We have been very fortunate to benefit from the generosity of in kind contributions from our contractors throughout the planning and early stages of this project. We also appreciate the support from Twin Cities Insulation and Leeds Construction who have agreed to allow access to their properties to facilitate the work to be done.

The committee is currently finalizing necessary permits with TIR and hopes the work will begin in early September, once roadwork is complete. The plan for a second phase of work will continue along the Goodwood stretch in 2020. The hope is that future iterations will continue further along the Prospect Road as road improvements move through, and if local communities and their members have interest in continuing the work started by the Goodwood Beautification Project.

## **Prospect Road Seniors Group**

Those 55 years of age or older are welcome! This club formed in 2002 to bring together older members of the Prospect Area to create and enjoy recreational activities and social interaction n our community. We go there to have fun and enjoy each others' company. We keep the club going all year as many of the seniors rely on this as their only outing during the week. We meet weekly at the White's Lake Legion every Wednesday afternoon. We have between 70-75 members, and each week three or four card tables are set up with different games and we have a share table where members bring in sandwiches and sweets for a lunch, at the bargain price of \$1. There is always a wonderful buffet of treats. The funds collected cover the cost of tea and coffee, plates, napkins, spoons, forks, etc.

We feel this club is vitally important to the physical and mental well-being of the seniors in our area. It has been a successful year in that we had a lot of activities throughout the year. We often bring in speakers or subjects of interest to seniors, including health, security, recreation and many others that our members might want. We also plan special events for the holidays, like St Patrick's Day and Valentine's Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas. Meals are provided during these events. At the first meeting of the month, birthdays of members born in that month are celebrated with a birthday cake and singing! Our senior club places a wreath on Remembrance Day at the White's Lake Royal Canadian Legion Ceremony for our seniors and soldiers. We rent the Legion each Wednesday and we provide an opportunity for activity and fellowship. We recently went on a movie/dinner night, which was enjoyed by all.

We do apply for and receive grants throughout the year which in turns allows the funds to go further toward the health of our members. We bought a new microphone for our meetings, new coffee and tea makers, washer toss and bean bag games and a step counter for each member who would be interested in counting their steps. Last winter, we crossed Canada using our steppers to track our journey, and we'll resume again in September to come back across Canada, one step at a time!

We have a committee that organizes our events: President, Johanne Blackburn; Vice Chair, Thelma Ryan; Secretary, Betty Maxner; and



Treasurer, Don Ray. We have a \$5 membership fee for the year, and hold a 50/50 draw each week. The executive have and will remain the driving force behind this organization. In conjunction with the membership, we plan the various activities for the benefit of all. Then, the executive put the plans into action so that the outings or the education efforts are safe and a benefit to the members.

The original organizers realized there were a number of seniors in the area and that there was little in place for them. Today, our members continue to increase, they have a safe place to congregate with people their own age and to enjoy companionship and activities with one another. If you would like to come and join our Senior's Group, we would love to have you. You will then get a sense of belonging, forget the loneliness, have some fun, get some light physical activity and improve mental health.

## **The Prospect Communities Farmers Market**

# The best of the Nova Scotia market season is just around the corner!

The Prospect Communities Farmers' Market has been in full swing since our 3rd season began in early June. This year has been filled with growth; we've been working really hard on asking specific, well informed questions, listening to responses whole heartedly, and focusing on making decisions that are in the best interest of both guests and vendors...

And who can forget about the addition of Sunday Brunch at the Kitchen Window Café?! This year through the hard work and vision of our Programs and Events Manager, Kitchen Coordinator and some really amazing volunteers, we have been able to offer brunch every second Sunday in partnership with the farmers' market. Brunch begins an hour ahead of the farmers' market at 9:30am to give community members a chance to fill their bellies and caffeinate accordingly before they shop. You will find old favorites from last year like breakfast sandwiches, eggs benny, skillets and new additions like our Big Farmer's Breakfast. As per usual, gluten-free and take out options are always available.

The fall harvest will bring a bounty of delectable, locally grown items to our market; apples, (late) berries, crisp arugula, tasty root veg and pumpkins, just to name a few.

We've also worked to bring some learning opportunities to the market and following a few workshops earlier in the season, will be offering two final workshops this Fall: FOUND Forgotten Food - Food Waste Reduction Information Session on September 8th, 2019 from 11:30am-1pm and a Fermentation Basics Workshop on September 22nd, from 10am-2pm - This will be a hands on workshop which will have you preparing your own ferments to take home. You can register for these sessions by calling the PRCC front desk at (902)852-2711. Note that the majority of our workshops have a \$5 registration fee & some workshops will have an additional fee applied to cover program supplies.

Our challenge with the farmers' market has become a chicken and an egg situation; the community is asking for a bigger market with more variety, and we have been working to recruit vendors to help us achieve this goal, however we have to be mindful of guest volume to ensure that we are not making decisions that take sales away from existing vendors and put them in a position that they need to evaluate their ongoing participation in Prospect. Many of our existing vendors have taken on co-operative type relationships with other vendors who can't be with us, to help us improve the market offering. Thanks to these vendors you can now find fresh eggs, meat from Martock Glenn Farms, cheese from Fox Hill Cheese and vegan, non-dairy cheese from Fauxmage



based in PEI (you NEED to stop by the market to try it - it's so tasty on crackers and this is coming from a non-vegan, dairy cheese aficionado!).

For the farmers' market to be successful, grow our offering and attract new vendors we need to have the support of the community, for people to come out and shop, develop relationships with the vendors and to share their feedback with us.

As a community member do you know what you should do if you notice an issue in one of the areas sports fields, playgrounds or parks?

The best course of action is to call 311 to report the issue. This number connects you to a municipal customer service centre where a representative will take the details of the issue and ensure the proper departments and partners are notified. You'll also be given a reference number that you can use to followup on, or forward to the local Councilor or PRRA should you need further assistance. It is extremely important for these issues to be reported and reference numbers allow us to obtain the record of reporting and any actions taken to remedy the issue. Don't be afraid to report the issue – sometimes multiple reports help with a speedier resolution.

The PRRA also invites community groups to get involved in the Recreation Association

and ask one or two members from local groups and organizations to attend our monthly meetings, which are typically held at the Prospect Road Community Centre. Please email the Chair, Kelly Carlton at <u>kelly@prospectcommunities.com</u> should you like to be added to the PRRA email list.

# **Route 333 Refugee Sponsorship Association**

On May 24, Route 333 Refugee Sponsorship Association welcomed the al Hasan family from Syria to Halifax under Canada's Blended Visa Office-Referred (BVOR) program, which matches refugees identified by the United Nations Refugee Agency with private sponsors.

The family of six arrived to a furnished apartment in downtown Halifax, and a kitchen full of food - thanks to donations from kind people in the Prospect Road communities. The family's youngest children looked in their new bedrooms and found stuffed animals donated by children in the community.

"Thank you". "Welcome." Were words often repeated. The family of six came to Halifax knowing only a handful of words in English. Within days of arriving, the al Hasan's youngest son started elementary school and his older sister started junior high. Embraced by the school communities, they started learning English and met children they could talk to and play with. The children had sporadic schooling having lived in Turkey for several years since being forced to leave their home in Aleppo, Syria.

The family's 21-year-old son started English classes at Immigrant Services Association of Nova Scotia (ISANS). He is learning a new language but also learning how to read and write. After only a few weeks of classes he was in a car one day and spelled out a street sign, "C O N N A U G H T". Before coming to Canada, he worked for a sewing company. He would like to start a small sewing business at home to make money for his family.

In September, the family's parents and oldest daughter will start English classes. Both the mother and father have multiple health problems and have been seen several times by the medical team at the Newcomer Health Clinic in Halifax. They are impressed with the care they have received.

Under the BVOR program, the federal government provides families with six months of financial support and private sponsors give another six months support during the year-long sponsorship. Route 333 Refugee received six months of financial support for the al Hasans through the BVOR Fund, a fund established by the



University of Ottawa Refugee Hub and Jewish Family Services, in partnership with founding donors.

For private sponsors like Route 333 Refugee, the main job is to help families integrate into their new community and navigate the complexities of a new country and culture.

Since arriving, we have been in awe of how much the al Hasan's have learned and the completely new life they are creating. They are resourceful and kind. They say they like Canada, the people here, and all the generosity and respect they have received.

The al Hasan's are the second family from Syria Route 333 Refugee has sponsored. The first family arrived in July 2017 and are still living and working in Halifax.

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# SS Atlantic Heritage Park Society Gathers Stories in Celebration of Anniversary

As a child, I remember walking with my mother to my grandmother's house. It was 3 P.M.—teatime. We would sit under the snowball bush in the front yard, and as I sat and contemplated the ants on the walkway, my mother and her mother would exchange the week's stories. Who they saw and what they did. At some point it would morph into a "Do you remember ...?" type of conversation. At that point, I would usually stop pestering the ants and just listen. These stories told me much about my parents' and grandparents' lives, who they were before they were my mother and grandmother. They described places in the past, places I had never been and could never go. These stories were my oral history. Unfortunately I remember very few of them.

Oral History is the collection and study of the voices and memories of people and communities. It is collected by recording an interview. With support from the Province of Nova Scotia, Department of Communities, Culture and Heritage, the SS Atlantic Heritage Park Society is doing an Oral History Project to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the wreck of the SS Atlantic and to celebrate the community around us. The Society has selected three Community Outreach Coordinators from the local communities. They are Krystal Harrie, Emily Kiley, and Paul Smith. They have begun conducting audio interviews and will continue into the fall. The audio recordings will be available at a listening station in the SS Atlantic Interpretive Centre.

To date we have collected stories about the popular church summer picnics, the schooner that delivered food, the bear that came to pick blueberries, floating houses across the bay, ducks for Easter dinner, and table cloths made out of Robin Hood Flour cotton bags. And yes, a tale or two about the SS Atlantic wreck and rescue. We are looking for memories and stories from residents of Upper Prospect, Lower Prospect and Terence Bay, related to:

- » Personal stories about life in the community
- » Stories passed down through generations about life in the community
- » Memories passed down about the SS Atlantic wreck and rescue.



I hope everyone had a relaxing, yet active summer. It is a pleasure to provide another update on some of the ongoing projects and recently secured funding for the Prospect Rd communities. I've been having some great discussions with everyone, having visited doorsteps in Terence Bay, Prospect Bay, Prospect, Hatchet Lake, and more over the last few months. I take all of those suggestions and comments seriously to help better represent you and your families.

### **Goodwood Beautification**

In June, I announced \$25,000 from the Department of Municipal Affairs for a Beautification and Streetscaping Project, in Goodwood, along the Prospect Road. This grant application was put together by Maureen Yeadon, Shirley Jollimore, Frank Johnston, Bob Dooley, and Raïssa Musial.

Councillor Steve Adams and the Department of Transportation and Infrastructure Renewal are also assisting our committee as we plan a multi-year project to help beautify the Prospect Rd along the Goodwood area. More to come on this exciting project soon!

### **Prospect Rd Active Transportation Lanes**

The shoulder widening project better accommodates more active transportation, and makes Prospect Rd safer for all people who travel on it. After hearing from many of you about excessive delays during the first couple of days of operation, we were able to have the contractor stop working before PM rush hour and improve traffic control to limit traffic queues as much as possible.
